
Presidents Corner:

Local Growers Hurricane Prep and post storm reports.

Beryl Blows through Cypress - Northwest Houston Donna Christy


The strong easterly wind from Beryl tore through the plumeria grove upending pots and uprooting trees. Some of the worst damage was done to the 8 ft . Aztec Gold, with branches ripped off the tree by the strong wind of Beryl. Though I had removed lots of leaves from the tallest trees, those were the most damaged with the Aztec Gold losing 6 limbs. These broken branches have been recut and placed to root.

Coastal living brings its own set of challenges during a hurricane due to the storm surge and salt spray.

Storm surge was predicted to be 3-5 feet above mean sea level as Beryl hit land. It surged to 5.03 feet at our house.



Plunging plumeria trees in the flowerbeds allowed for the quick extraction of plants that would have been overtaken by the surge.



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These plants were stored under the house during the storm. What I did not anticipate was the effect the salt spray would have on the plants. After noticing the salt on the windows and cars, the process of rinsing the salt from the plants started immediately.

First a freshwater rinse and then using a hose end sprayer, all the plants received a foliar spray and a soil drench of Medina Soil Activator Plus. The Medina Soil Activator Plus helps to neutralize the salt. The process was repeated 2 days later. One week following the storm, the trees look great!

Before the fury of Beryl's winds arrived, I laid my big plants in pots over to prevent breakage of limbs and thankfully I had no broken limbs.

A few of my inground plumerias were uprooted and laid over by the hurricane force winds but none lost tips. Finding a silver lining in the storm, I picked off my blooms and created six beautiful leis.

We all know Hurricane Beryl came barreling through our area July 8th. It was reported to be a Cat 1 but areas south and west of Houston recorded winds of 100+ mph resulting in 2.5M people without power, some to this day.

As for my greenhouse, I consider myself very lucky. Yes, the majority of trees went down and lots of small tips lost. Surprisingly, relatively few large trees were severely damaged. My greenhouse itself suffered minor damage from three 6-8" limbs that toppled onto it but slid off the side.





Still some chainsaw work to do and debris to haul off but it could have been much, much worse.

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Side note: Beryl was a dress rehearsal. We are only in late July and the Atlantic season doesn't peak until mid-September. NOAA is predicting a much more active than normal season.





Use the current lull to tighten up preparations to protect lives, homes and plumeria.

Hi John, I did not take any pictures. All my 1-gallon plants were grouped together and suffered no damage at all. I normally cut leaves and spray with Bayer fungicide to prevent rust. This year I did not have time to do it. My big trees, full of leaves were devastated by the whirling wind. A lot of broken large branches. Some standard trees were cut in half. Next year, I am going to make sure I cut the leaves in June. The plants with few leaves take the wind a lot better.

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Beryl had mercy on the Willis plumerias, home, RV Building and the rest of the family. He was a bit perturbed at our auto garage ripping soffit and fascia and a few shingles about. We know from experience aluminum work can be difficult to find. But there is no water leaking through (yet). We had a few pecan branches break but everyone knows this does not take much.

Now for what really counts around here. No plumerias broken, no bloom heads snapped, a few tall ones laid over a bit and no problem straightening in the soft soil. Because I don't do my flea market any longer, I have done many pots they could hardly fall over in the wind. They seemed to hold each other upright.





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Here is the part that could have been much worse. We lacked 4 hours of being without power for 10 full days and nights. We became motor homers once again living and sleeping in air conditioning with wires running to the house to the fridge and freezer. Gotta keep that ice cream hard. For Nan, of course.

After a week or so some very good friends lugged diesel fuel for us. I helped quite a bit (mostly by staying out of their way).

When John Burford contacted me asking for input for the next newsletter, I replied that I did not have much to report but I would see what I could come up with. Well, it didn't take long for something to come up, Hurricane Beryl was making its way across the Yucatan and would be coming out into the Gulf of Mexico as a tropical storm headed towards the upper Mexico, Texas coast.

As many of us that live on the Texas coast know, the projection for landfall will change many times before the storm comes inland and preparations need to be made early. For awhile it was heading our way so after talking to Dr. Michael Womack at the South Texas Botanical Gardens a decision was made that we should cut a lot of the leaves off to reduce the weight on the branches and protect them from breakage if we were to have heavy rain and high winds. Our collection is planted in the ground, so we are not able to lay them down or dig them up for storms that may come through.







In 2017 when Hurricane Harvey hit Rockport, we had major breakage, and we were hoping to avoid this happening again. With a quick email and text messages our members were able to come out and help with the cutting back the leaves. Many of the branches were so heavy and full of leaves, they really needed the trimming anyway.

By Sunday afternoon, the forecast was showing a more northern turn towards the upper Texas coast with the Beryl approaching hurricane strength. We were out of the danger zone but our friends and families in the Houston area were the target. We here in Corpus Christi are so sorry to hear and see the damages and loses many have suffered and hoping for a quick recovery for the city and everyone.

On another note, our Annual Plumeria Sale is Saturday, July 27th, 2024, at the Garden Senior Center. We have 12 sellers this year with an inventory of rooted plants, seedlings and seeds will be available. Plumerias will include many named varieties and NOIDS in a wide variety of colors and sizes.
